



- The learning experience is rooted in a **Christian faith**, 42% (up 12 points from 2017);
- The school has a **strong academic reputation**, 39% (up 13 points from 2017);
- The school has **rigorous academics**, 24% (up ten points from 2017);
- The school has a **focus on research**, 17% (up 11 points from 2017).




What is Strategic Enrollment Management (SEM)?

- Strengthen communication and working relations across divisions.
- Improve retention and graduation rates.





SEM Plan Strategies & Tactics



Strategies & Tactics



- 1. Earlier and enhanced engagement with diverse and talented high school students.
- 2. More fundraising focused on scholarships for students with financial need.
- 3. Address courses with unexpectedly high failure rates.



Strategies & Tactics



- 4. Review policies that impact retention.
- 5. Develop college-specific retention and graduation plans.
- 6. Increase high-impact practices such as study abroad, internships, and living/learning communities.
